Thomas H. Kean served as governor of New Jersey from 1982 to 1990. He promoted the State's identity through "The New Jersey and You — Perfect Together" campaign; and was known for innovation in education; higher education and private sector technology partnerships; expanded support for the arts; and protection of inland waterways and freshwater wetlands and **-more-**
